Escape rooms attracting corporate groups interested in building team morale

"The rooms are really good at deporting a few different styles of collaboration. People both work together really closely at some times but then they also work independently. It's important to be able to switch between those two modes of collaboration and the escape rooms that we study, do a really good job of that. It allows people to fluidly move back and forth."

Neustaedter notes they are really well designed to support verbal communication.

"In escape rooms they actually foster their skills in verbal communication as opposed as nonverbal communication. [It makes you] look at people's body language, so [escape rooms] are really good at enhancing the way people talk to each other because of their design and the time constraint." He says there may be some short-term pain in the form of arguments, but in the end a company's employees should be more comfortable working together once they experience is over, even if they don't escape.
